There is also a section where you can make a donation to the ABA Commemorative Fund to honor those you would like to see recognized. \$100 donations are recognized in the Yearbook and on the website and it is a Who's Who of ABA greats and supporters over the years!

Michelle Lynch is adding all sanctioned shows to the event calendar which is a great feature to use when planning your show schedules! We have over 250 Shows in our database and show secretaries can get with Michelle to update their contact information.

Types of Membership

Individual - If you join as an individual, "John Smith", all wins accumulated in our award system will be awarded to "John Smith". Even if you show under another name like John, Kaylee, and Brendon Smith, the wins will be awarded to "John Smith"

Farm Name - If you join as a Farm ("JS Cochins") all wins accumulated in our award system will be awarded to "JS Cochins". We will need a person's name as a secondary identifier. Remember to use that Farm name as your exhibitor information.

Family Name- If you join as a Family "John & Kaylee Smith Family", all wins accumulated in our award system will be awarded to "John & Kaylee Smith Family". If you are in a family and everyone wants their wins to accumulate in their own name, you will need to have everyone hold their own individual membership.

Life Memberships - These are available for individuals only. The cost is \$1,000. These funds are invested in the ABA Irrevocable Trust fund. Only earnings will be used to support the day-to-day operations of the ABA.

NEW FOR 2024: Club Memberships

Starting in 2024, to sanction a meet with the ABA, the club MUST hold a membership with the ABA. This fee is \$50 annually and includes one sanctioned show per year. A club who hosts more than one show will need to pay an additional \$25 per sanction fee. (This will result in a savings for most active clubs over the prior rules.)

The meeting of the board of Directors of the American Bantam Association was called to order at 6:55 pm by President, Bill Patterson. The following were in attendance: Bill Patterson, ABA President; Matt Lhamon, VP; DD #1 Steve Stanulonis, DD #2 Robert Bentley (zoom), DD #3 Emily Shoop (Kim Munden - proxy); DD #4 Paul Gilroy (zoom); DD #5 Mike Sayre; DD #6 Amy Gabbard (zoom); DD #7 Chad Satterfield (zoom); DD #8 Brett Thompson; DD #9 Jackie Koedatich; DD #10 Garry Rossman (zoom); DD #11 Jacob Bates; DD #12 Bob Choate; DD #13 Kyle Tripp; DD #14 Timothy Sheets (zoom); DD #16 John Beamer (zoom); Troy Laroche, Constitution and By-laws Committee; Kim Munden, ABA Secretary Proxy.

Bill thanked the Oklahoma Poultry Federation for their efforts and cooperation with this ABA 2023 National Meet. We are doing well in the apprentice program with nine new apprentices, bringing the total to 16 apprentices in the program, three ready to test. Jimmy Sorrells was administered his test at Knoxville, TN and he passed. There will be several apprentices clerking at this show.

We also would like to remind all Show Secretaries that all judges at an ABA Sanction Meet that are not ABA licensed must be ABA Members or your ABA show sanction will not be valid.

Constitution and By-Laws Committee Report: Presented by Troy Laroche

We just voted on the weight issue. Currently we have nothing else on the books. If anyone has anything, submit it and we can get working on it.

Health & Regulations Committee Report: submitted by Dr. Curtis Geary

Avian influenza has not been in the headlines as much this year as in 2022, but we continue to see positives in backyard flocks. We had 566 cases of high path AI and backyard flocks this year as of this writing, and 32 cases in backyard flocks for the month of November 2023. Which is up from just one case in September and 19 in October. I want to note that backyard flock does not equate to flocks raised for exhibition. Most breeders of exhibition poultry are very diligent in keeping their flocks safe and very few exhibition breeder's flocks are affected. This is just a reminder we must continue to keep bio security a priority. The NPIP is doing a revision and proposing some changes that most likely won't affect most of us directly, but if you have any interest or run a hatchery or import birds you may be interested in proposing changes/already proposed changes.

Grievance Committee Report:

Presented by Bill Patterson

Happy to report that there are no grievances at this time.

Standard Committee Report:

Presented by Kyle Tripp

There are a few things in the works. Wheaten American Serama – qualifying meet paperwork submitted and paid; however qualifying meet has not been

scheduled. Blue Quail Watermaals wanted to have their qualifying.

meet at Columbus, OH but Kyle encourages qualifying meets be done at ABA National Meets, so they will be rescheduling.

I have not heard anything about the weight change either negative or positive, so it really has not been a factor. Looking forward to our next Standard printing. Our third edition of the ABA Standard was printed in 1976 and that was the edition that Frank Geary considered to be the first complete edition of the bantam standard. So, I am proposing we do our new edition of the standard to be released at the ABA National in Columbus, OH in 2025 and the standard be the 2026 edition and would be the 50th year anniversary of that 1976 standard. That standard listed breeds that are not recognized and listed the inactive breeds and varieties. As a piece of nostalgia or to commemorate that we would like to redo that and would list everything, with a notation, that is inactive or not recognized any longer and therefore would remove the need to contact the ABA for the description. Sam Wulff is collecting more photos that are a better representation of the breed and variety.

Our inventory of the current Standard is low, Karen has been working with Barnes and Noble to print small batches as we need them until the new edition is ready to be printed. Barnes and Noble also have the technology to make the Standard into a digital version and give it an ISBN number. You could purchase the digital book, but it would not be transferrable to anyone else, just like books you buy on Kindle. Matt stated that we are looking at getting our entire library made available digitally.

There was discussion about the mini-Standard being hard to read and once we go through the current inventory, that issue will be addressed.

Irrevocable Trust Report: Submitted by Karen Unrath

Bill mentioned losing Russ and the tremendous job he did with this. We are working on getting another trustee on board.

Trust Specifics: Account Value as of November 28, 2023: \$99,489.77

Funds paid to ABA in 2023: \$10,000.00.

Asset allocation: Domestic stock 83.2%, Foreign stock 3.7%, bonds 0.8%, Short term 12.2%, Other 0.2%

The above shows our investment allocation showing 83.2% stock, Matt Lhamon and Karen will be reviewing the investments to maximize our investment strategy going forward. No new Life Memberships have been sold this year.

A motion was made to accept the following reports: Judges Licensing Committee, Constitution and By-Laws, Health and Regulations Committee, Grievance Committee, Standard Committee, and Irrevocable Trust Report by Kyle Tripp. It was seconded by Jacob Bates. Motion carried unanimously.

Secretary's Report:

Submitted by Karen Unrath, discussed by Matt Lhamon

Discussion was held on keeping membership dues the same for 2024. We have been implementing other cost reduction strategies to keep dues unchanged. Discussion was held on reinstituting Show Club dues at \$50 per year which would include one sanction show per year. All additional shows would require a \$25.00 sanction fee per show. The current structure does not require club dues at all – Just a \$50 sanction fee per show. By doing this, we could maintain accurate club records and help with club interaction with the ABA beyond show reports. These show club memberships would be treated as regular members, and they would be mailed a yearbook each year to keep them in the loop of ABA news plus it would encourage them to consider supporting us with ads.

The secretary recommended keeping yearbook ad rates the same as 2023. Discussion was held about the great response in advertising this year, but the production costs have risen due to a larger color section, as well as postage and paper costs rising. We need to encourage club page advertising because that has dropped. A suggestion was made to make the yearbook digital, but right now it is a selling point of a benefit of being a member and advertisers want to see their ad in print. Kim mentioned that she and Karen are going to look at taking

out redundancies in next year's book to help keep production costs reasonable.

A motion was made to keep the membership rates the same for 2024 and reinstitute show club dues of \$50 by Jacob Bates. It was seconded by John Beamer. Motion carried unanimously.

A motion was made to keep the yearbook ad rates the same for 2024 by Kyle Tripp. It was seconded by Bob Choate. Motion carried unanimously.

Financial reports were shared.

Matt mentioned that we are doing good this year and we still have numbers to add for the rest of the year and we should hit or be over what was projected. Bill stated that the online store is doing well.

Balance Sheet November 26, 2023 – Total assets \$76,687.00 (increase of 15,136 over the past 11 months)

2023 Financials as of November 30, 2023 Revenue \$ 128,720.10 (+ 6,665.93 over budget) Expenses \$123,376.74 (+1,375 over budget)

A motion to accept the 2023 financial reports was made by Mike Sayre and seconded by John Beamer. Motion carried unanimously.

2024 Budget projections were submitted for board approval.

There was discussion on dues structure, stipend fees, and other cost considerations. It was suggested to send out yearbook advertising to poultry clubs and having their contact information from them becoming members would help. Legband costs will be reduced after this coming year.

A motion to accept the 2024 budget was made by Steve Stanulonis and seconded by Mike.

Sayre. Motion carried unanimously.

New Business:

Wild Apricot, membership software presented by Matt Lhamon They have their own website and when you click to join from our website it will take you there to renew or join. There are areas for upcoming events, a forum place, and a feature member. At the bottom there is a button to click to become a member. Contact information can be filled in here and it also takes payment based on the length of membership you select. This information will then go directly into the membership database. As for the membership management portion of the software, Matt took the time to enter all our current members into the software and shared how it shows what type of membership and length, etc. 15 – 20% of members have no email on file. It has digital membership cards, a way to send out renewals automatically as well as auto renewal and shows when you originally joined. Club members can also pay for sanctioned shows too. Karen, Michelle, and Matt must approve new members. This will move the ABA to a higher tech way to keep track of our membership. It was suggested that the donations may not go into the endowment and be put in a possible contingency fund.

Meet placement rotation:

The ABA no longer disqualifies birds that are over or under 20% of the ideal weight. If the judge feels that a bird is too light or too heavy it will be a 4-point deduction. We are preparing a new edition of the Standard and will include inactive breed descriptions. The 2026 edition would be the 50th year anniversary of the first complete standard and the goal is to have it ready for the ABA National in Columbus, OH in 2025.

Irrevocable Trust Report:

Bill mentioned the passing of one of our trustees and the club is working on getting another trustee on board. The ABA only uses the interest for operating costs and that was around \$10,000 this year.

Secretary's Report:

Matt reported that we are keeping membership dues the same for 2024 and are reinstituting Show Club dues at \$50 per year, including one sanction show per year. The yearbook ad rates for 2024 will be the same as 2023. We need to encourage club page advertising because that has dropped.

Bill stated the club is doing well and the directors finalized the 2024 budget the night before. 


